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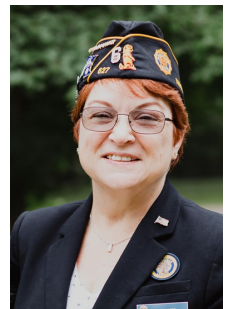

MEMORIAL DAY SUNDAY SERVICE MAY 24, 2020

The annual Memorial day service will be held Sunday, May 24th at 10am at the Outdoor Worship Center on Daggett Pine Road with gates opening at 9:15am. The outdoor worship area is in compliance with the current Minnesota Department of Health guidelines and practices for the service comply with regulations at the time of print of this newsletter. The service will start begin at 10am with Pastors Kristin Oltmann and Kurt Hagestuen presiding. Attendees are asked to stay in their vehicles during the entire service and practice social distancing. This yearly service honors and remembers our deceased military veterans who served our country.

The service includes our featured guest speaker- Susan Edwards-Post commander for the Billie Brown Post 627 in Nisswa. She served in the United States Air Force as a law enforcement K-9 handler and is currently serving as 6th district Adjutant and chairwoman of the Department Law and Order Committee. A graduate of the National American Legion College, she is a strong proponent for women veterans, an active Legion Rider, served on the Children and Youth Committee at the 2019 National Legion convention and serves as editor of the 6th District Newsletter. She has recently been endorsed for Department Chaplain by her home post and the 6th District Executive committee. Susan and her husband Paul (current 6th District commander and Army and Air Force veteran) are both retired from Boeing Co. and have a son currently serving in the United States Army.



The service will also feature a contingent of the American Legion color guard from the Crosslake post firing an honorary salute to the dead, patriotic songs, TAPS and a flyover at 10:45 am (weather permitting) by the North Star Squadron. Recognition of veterans and military families will also be part of this very special day of remembrance.

Dear Friends in Christ,

We miss you! The handshakes, the hugs, the singing, the many conversations that happened so often in day to day church life! I think we all realize how much LIFE that brought us, especially as the Holy Spirit works in our community of Crosslake Lutheran giving us such meaningful connections in so many ways. This is a very hard time as we miss those tangible connections, and yet we are thankful for the ways we can still be connected. Perhaps this current time also gives us a renewed sense of gratitude for what we may have taken for granted before the pandemic.

Thank you for all the ways that you are a part of keeping our community connected in ministry and relationship during this time as Christ moves mightily among us.

As we head toward the end of May and into June, Pentecost, the High Holy Day of celebrating the gift of the Holy Spirit is coming up, it's May 31st. Now, Pentecost has never really gotten the glory it deserves as a church Holy Day. It often plays second fiddle to Easter and Christmas or gets pushed out by Memorial Day or even just overshadowed by plain old warm weather that we Minnesotans yearn for when we're still getting snow in May! Yikes! But, I dare say, 2020 is the year for Pentecost to shine! I think the High Holy Day of Pentecost may finally get its big chance this year! Might we be able to celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit with the fervor and vigor it calls for now? Who knows? But let's try!

And we've got a great way to give our Big Pentecost Celebration a boost this year, so it can feel like an Easter or Christmas level celebration – because **Pentecost is the day that we are going to start celebrating Holy Communion again on May 31!**

As it becomes clear that we are in a “modified” worship experience for a while, we are going to celebrate Holy Communion for this extraordinary time in an extra ordinary way. At both the recorded service and the In Car Outdoor Service, the pastor will say the Words of Institution with the elements as normal and pray the Lord's Prayer. These will also be printed in your bulletin. Then, when you go home – you are invited to repeat these words to yourself, or with your family, and then share together, giving Communion to each other in your home. It's extending the worship service into your home by using your own elements (bread or crackers and wine or juice) with a special plate and cup. Maybe you want to set up a little altar area with a candle and tablecloth or placemat. This extension of the worship service into our homes to commune is the safest option; and it also keeps us united in practice as some people continue to remain at home watching the recorded service while others choose to come to the In Car Outdoor worship. This also keeps us in line with the MN Department of Health regulations. If you have questions about this feel free to contact one of us pastors. There will be instructions in the bulletin as well, whenever we have Holy Communion in this extraordinary time of modified worship.

And prior to May 31, comes another special Sunday since it's our **Memorial Day Worship on May 24**. We thank all those who have worked so hard to make that day as safe as possible with the continued traditions that many in the community enjoy. Due to safety issues, we will need to space the cars six feet apart, so we have arranged overflow parking lots, since we will have limited space. If you don't mind simply listening to the service, instead of seeing everything, perhaps consider parking in the overflow lots (the radio signal reaches these lots), so visitors can have space in Outdoor Site. The overflow lots are Crosslake Presbyterian Church and the Community Center. We look forward to these special worship services!

Bishop Tom Aitken, our synodical bishop, has also been sending out regular communication and guidance about how to plan for using our facilities again for ministry and for worship. There are some excellent documents available on the Northeastern MN Synod website, and we have included some excerpts from one of Bishop Tom's letters, along with another letter from the MN bishops. They are helping our church leadership discern how to prepare to open up again in a safe manner. It's suggested that each congregation form a Smart team starting with the pastor(s) and council. Our Smart team is our congregational president, Brian Boyda, vice president, Lori Nelson, parish nurse Gail Smith, and our two pastors. Our Smart team will be working to figure out many policies and procedures that align with government, health, insurance, and safety regulations in order for us to begin “turning the dial” for our own church gathering needs at both our church facility and the Outdoor worship site. We appreciate your understanding and patience. Please pray for us!

Speaking of prayer, our prayer for you is this great one from Ephesians, we “pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love.” Ephesians 3:16-17

EXCERPTS FROM BISHOP TOM'S LETTER:

Dear Synod,

I am thankful for the faithful and mature leaders in our synod who put faith and intelligence together as they lead these days.



Pandemics have been a part of history throughout the world. Health experts expect virus infections, these are not surprises. On Tuesday, May 5, I participated in a zoom presentation hosted by the ELCA Minneapolis Area Synod in which Dr. Michael Osterholm talked about COVID-19. It was sobering and honest, yet I felt a kind of relief that we could courageously name what is happening with this pandemic, and do it with other leaders intelligently. Dr. Osterholm is a member of Edina Community Lutheran Church. He is an epidemiologist and the Director of the University of Minnesota Center for Infectious Disease Research and Policy. He stressed the long-term nature of this global health crisis and the importance of our taking steps to mitigate the rapid spread of the virus. He stressed that “we live in virus time and the virus will continue to seek out and attach to humans.” Today it is the number one cause of death in the USA, surpassing for example cancer and heart disease. Aerosol spreading through coughing, sneezing, talking, singing is the deadliest form of transmission. If you could use a glow light to see the particles in a room where people were in, even hours after you would be very surprised at the aerosol particles left there. We have to really think carefully before bringing people together in rooms, even with physical distancing and no touch, such as the choir members in a church in Seattle. Testing and contract tracing helps of course. We will continue to see a spread. While new cases of the coronavirus may decline periodically, we will have this health crisis until one of the following occurs:

- **A vaccine is developed, produced and distributed widely, or**
- **60% - 70% of the population is infected and herd immunity is developed**

Until then we are all susceptible but especially the more vulnerable in our midst. That means people of any age with underlying health conditions (e.g. asthma, diabetes, heart conditions and older people) are especially at risk of the disease and even death. Dr. Osterholm stressed we need to be prepared for some tumultuous months ahead. There is both the unpredictability and yet the certainty of the virus. Using visual images the activity of the virus could be like any of the following:

- **A slow burn of a fire across a field of grass**
- **Waves of differing size that come crashing periodically with lulls between**
- **One huge sudden outbreak**

Thoughts and recommendations from Bishop Tom:

- 1) We still have no certainty about when congregations will be able to gather in person for worship. Remember aerosol transmission. I urge us to be patient and wise and continue to be the Body of Christ we already are. Don't be bullied by the emotions of some into gathering in person too soon.
 - 2) Now is the time to begin to intelligently prepare for the months ahead. Carefully consult the two documents available on the NE MN synod website:
 - Guidelines for Returning to Gathering In-Person in our Congregations
 - Returning to the Sanctuary: Worship Resources
 - 3) Get your "Smart" team together. A Smart Team starts with your Pastor and Council and then includes others in the congregation who understand true health concern and who combine faith and intelligence. We need our most capable and non-anxious leaders right now, who understand how serious COVID-19 is and that decisions to return back to an in-person gathering of any kind in the church building will need to be very well planned out. Remember to start with the Gospel: Christ our Lord is with us, now and always. You can count on it. It's a promise. When it is safe to think in-person gathering, deal with all the issues: Cleaning, distancing, insurance, no singing, multiple worship services due to size, care of those who can't be there, Holy Communion safe practices, outdoor worship possibilities. There may be a relatively safer time to gather, only to be followed by the "wall of the hurricane" afterward. We have to remain vigilant.
 - 4) Plan on a gradual and phased in return to Gatherings in person in your congregation.
 - 5) Encourage high risk people to stay at home, continue to offer online worship for all.
 - 6) Protect your congregation from liability: Check with your insurance carrier and an attorney if you have one or know one that could help you. Don't risk the legal issues that could follow an outbreak caused by negligence or ignoring recommended practices.
 - 7) Be both loving and understanding of all and make that the beginning reminder at every planning meeting while at the same time, lead with confidence that health concerns are paramount.
 - 8) Keep on doing the good job of connecting with one another, especially with the phone for all your congregational members in whatever way works for your congregation. Connection with each other is so important, and I'm grateful for the ways I hear you spreading this connecting ministry around in different ways.
 - 9) The Church is changing. That's not all bad. We are more grateful today for those things we took for granted as the Body of Christ. New ways of being the church is a good thing.
 - 10) I stand with all of you as your Synod Shepherd. We are bound forever in baptism and in Christ's promise of keeping us in this life and the next (something we don't often talk about, but should!)
- Let us continue to live honestly with our laments, smartly with our responses, and deeply in the gift of faith the Spirit grants us in these days even in the midst of this pandemic.

A Joint Statement from the Bishops of Minnesota

*Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn.
Live in harmony with one another.*

Romans 12:15-16

To the Pastors, Deacons, Leaders and Congregations of Minnesota:

Since we learned of the first confirmed case of COVID-19 in Minnesota on March 6, through the first stay at home order and its extensions to the moment of our writing today, we have lived in a rapidly changing reality. It has been over two months of transition and exploration, of creativity and innovation, of uncertainty and grief. Circumstances continue to evolve.

We are, as of this writing still living under Governor Walz's extended stay at home order. We know even as the current order expires, as is expected on May 18, things will not simply go back to the way they were.

We give thanks for you and all the ways you have remained flexible and faithful, striving to serve your congregations and ministry sites in the midst of this ever-changing reality. We acknowledge that innovation and experimentation will continue and that faithful responses may be as varied as the contexts we serve. We know there are multiple precautions to take as new challenges arise. The logistics of gathering when it is safe and wise to do so, the special concerns around singing and communion distribution, the reality that there will be those who desire to participate that cannot, these are only some of the myriad pieces we consider.

We the six bishops of the ELCA in Minnesota share particular values as we live and lead together - with you in this pandemic reality. We continue to engage with and listen to state and local officials. We look to scientists and epidemiologists to guide our decision making. We keep ever before us a commitment to the wellbeing of our neighbors, those in our congregations, communities and beyond. We remain focused on our shared vocation of proclaiming the gospel.

It is the good news of Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, that anchors our hope. As we continue to discern how to enter this next phase of life, we are committed to working together. We know particularities will vary with the specificities of context yet our shared values remain. As more detailed guidance is made available from the CDC and MN Department of Health we will continue to collaborate as we offer best practices in light of our shared values.

As we hold you in prayer, we give God thanks for your faithful witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

YOUTH AND CHILDREN

YOUTH MINISTRY We began hosting ZOOM Youth Ministry the instant we could not meet in person. These Wednesday evening sessions offer space to listen to each other as we each take turns telling the other how we are doing. Included in those sessions is some playfulness led by Pat Netko. Our youth, parents, and adult leaders lamented this decision but yet knew that that is was God active in keeping them safe. We are on the lookout for some local options when it becomes safe to do so.

VBS We have been in close conversation with Luther Crest Bible Camp. They have suspended all summer programming which includes the August Day Camp our K-6th graders love so much. The camp is refocusing efforts in a program called BOLD TRANSFORMATIONAL FAITH. This faith formation experience will provide activities such as Bible Dives, Worships, Camp Songs, and Craft and Games that can be done at home and will be available in August. Stay tuned for more details.

FIRST COMMUNION We will be connecting with our fifth graders and their families in the coming weeks with instructional materials about the gift of Christ's real presence in Communion. While more instruction will be given when we can be together, this at-home faith experience will allow our fifth graders to begin experiencing the promises given by God through the bread and wine in this sacrament.

In the month of April, revenues exceed expenses by \$1,861. YTD's performance is \$9,292 more than budget, because revenues are \$9,613 more than budget but expenses are \$321 more than budget.

PAYCHECK PROTECTION PROGRAM STATEMENT The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act was passed by Congress to help small businesses and nonprofits keep workers employed amid the pandemic and economic downturn. Part of the act, known as the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP), provides 100% federally guaranteed loans to eligible organizations, including churches. The loan amount, based on 2.5 times average monthly payroll, is forgivable if the loan proceeds are used to cover payroll and utilities during the 8 weeks following the loan. Because of the stay at home orders and our inability to gather in groups, we have been unable to conduct church services in the sanctuary since early March. Since the church relies on member's and guest's contributions received during these services, there was concern about maintaining our present staff levels with the shrinking revenue. With this in mind, our church council authorized me, as treasurer, to apply for this loan. I am pleased to say that we have just received our PPP loan of \$70,000. This money will be used by the church to pay for payroll and utilities during the next 8 weeks. After that time I will apply for the loan to be forgiven. - Paul Tender, Council Treasurer
