February Greetings!

“Songs of thankfulness and praise, Jesus, Lord, to thee we raise; manifested by the star to the sages from afar, branch of royal David’s stem in thy birth at Bethlehem: anthems be to thee addressed, God in flesh made manifest;” that was the first verse of our gathering hymn this past Sunday. It echoes my own feelings of thankfulness and praise to God this Epiphany season for many reasons.

I am grateful for another very meaningful season of Advent and Christmas worship and service events in which so many participated and also for the immense generosity of our congregation. We went into the month of December with a sizable financial deficit of around \$21,000. This is not a typical situation for our congregation, but as the final weeks of 2018 went along, we rose to the occasion. I am so pleased to tell you that by the year’s end, we had an excess of \$7,500, thank you! Our songs of thankfulness and praise to Jesus our Lord, who always provides, are loud and strong! We are grateful for another year of generous giving that makes the mission and ministry possible of Crosslake Lutheran Church.

As we continue moving forward in mission

and ministry, on January 20th and 23rd the Call Committee for the Associate Pastor was installed in worship. The co-chairs are Lori Blaukat and Brian Boyda, with members Aundra Erickson, Karen Larson, Bob Laven, Blake Millner, and myself. We’ve met with Deacon Brenda Tibbetts, who outlined the process for us, and we hope to have the Ministry Site Profile for our church approved by the Church Council by the end of February. After that, we can start doing interviews of interested candidates. We are thankful that this call process is moving along well.

And this brings us back to the hymn verse we started with, as we celebrate God made manifest during the season of Epiphany in February that will bring us all the way into the season of Lent, when we have Ash Wednesday on March 6. Watch for the Lenten theme of “Cultivating & Letting Go,” that we are looking forward to experiencing in worship, Bible Study, youth ministry, and other intergenerational ways. May this time of God made manifest bring you much thankfulness and praise, too, as we experience the shining light of Christ!

So, now that we've discussed what it means to be and live as the body of Christ, how does this apply to our lives and country today? David Brooks is one of America's most prominent political commentators. He will talk about both past and present times, helping us think about the Narrative of America and moving from a national story of "the Promised Land" based on the Exodus story to a new story of redemption and community building. He will help us think about how there is a new civic revival, and we will discuss what our role might be as the body of Christ in all of this. Come and be a part of this interesting presentation and our discussion that will help us see how the community is the unit of change. What might God and scripture have to say about all this? And how do we live out our faith in Christ engaged as these community builders for positive change at the local level?

Sharing God's Bounty

Christ's Love Compels Us

"For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, therefore all died. And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again" 2 Corinthians 5:14-15.

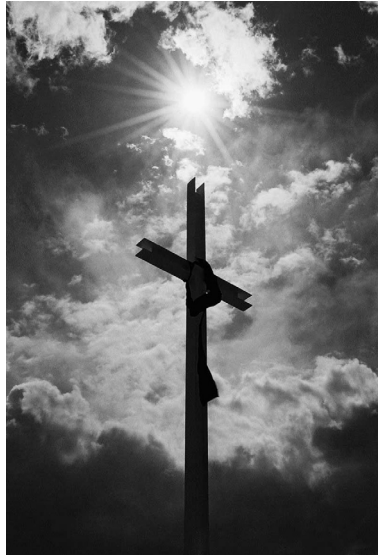
Some sons disobey their fathers. Others obey unwillingly with arguing and complaining, resentful of their fathers' authority. Still others are compliant, but are there any who would be as submissive as Jesus was to his Father's will? "...yet not my will, but yours be done," Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane (Luke 22:42). Carrying out his Father's will was no easy task, but, because his love for us is as great as the Father's, he was willing to win our salvation for us by carrying out the plan the Triune God had established before the foundations of the world were laid. It was his love for us that caused Christ to give his very life so that we, who were dead in sin, might be alive forevermore in him.

There is nothing we can do to earn this love; there is nothing we can do to "pay him back." The Christian life of stewardship is a response to his love. His love compels us to respond by loving him first and best and loving others as ourselves. His love compels us to provide for our pastors, teachers, and missionaries who work to bring the Gospel

to the world for which he died (1 Corinthians 9:9-12). His love compels us to look after the widow and the orphan (James 1:27). His love compels us to feed the hungry, extend hospitality to the homeless, clothe the destitute, and visit the prisoner (Matthew 25:37-40).

Stewardship is the use of life and all of life's resources in response to the grace of God in our lives, poured out in service to others, even as Christ poured out his lifeblood for us. The prophet Micah clarifies to us what God requires of us: "To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God" (Micah 6:8b). These are not attitudes we can work up of our own accord. Only as we are renewed daily through Word and Sacrament can we respond to this great love of Christ and respond in joyful service and generous giving that please God.

Taking a seat opposite the treasury, Jesus observed the crowd putting money into the collection box. Many of the wealthy put in sizable amounts; but one poor widow came and put in two small copper coins worth about a cent. He called his disciples over and told them: "*I want you to observe that this poor widow contributed more than all the others who donated to the treasury. They gave from their surplus wealth, but she gave from her want, all that she had to live on.*" Mark 12:41-44

Endowment Update

The Endowment Committee trustees have been busy and wanted to share with you what is going on. Before we get to that, we want to encourage you to read this article to the end. There is a tax saving idea that can help both you and the church. This idea is based on the new tax laws that are now in effect.

Back to the update; the trustees have made a financial commitment that should be of interest to you as a member of Crosslake Lutheran Church. First, we have agreed to purchase new microphones and equipment needed for the church Sanctuary. This should eliminate the problems encountered during the many special programs involving youth groups and other presentations which call for the hand-held microphones. Also approved was an increase in the money provided to our graduating high school seniors to help them with their chosen education choice. We also approved funds to be used for need-based Youth Mission Trips, scholarship money for Bible Camp, and money set aside for grounds and the Bell Tower beautification.

Please continue to read for the promised tax idea.

Did you know that if you have a federal income tax liability and you use the standard deduction (under the new tax law, this is most of us) you can allocate a portion of your

Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your IRA and save money. Here is what you need to do. You need to request your IRA administrator to send a portion of your RMD directly to the church. This distribution can be used to pay your annual pledge or to set up an endowment account in your name. How this works is that you can increase your pledge by 20% and save 22% off your Federal Income Tax Liability.

An example would be, if you currently pledge \$1,000 per year to the church, it costs you \$1,000. If you have \$1,200 from your RMD sent directly to Crosslake Lutheran, it costs you only \$936 (\$1,200 less \$264 in a federal taxes tax decrease). You save \$64. This example assumes a Federal Tax Rate of 22% and can work for any amount you choose. Both you and the church are winners.

One last thing, this idea is for regular IRA distributions and is not available for a 401K distribution. The Endowment Committee is neither a financial advisor nor a certified tax professional. You need to contact your own tax specialist and IRA administrator to implement this idea.

Valentine Care Packages for College Students!

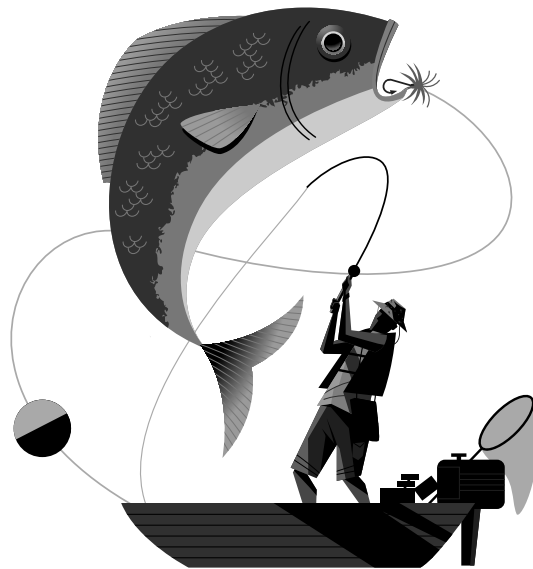
It's time to treat our college kids! We will be sending care packages of goodies to approximately 40 students just in time for Valentine's Day!

We would appreciate any monetary donations to help cover postage costs. If you have questions, please contact the church office.

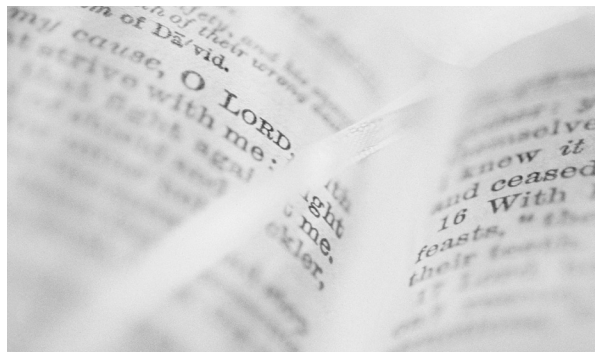
