Then Joshua said to the people, "Sanctify yourselves; for tomorrow the LORD will do wonders among you."

These words come from Joshua in the middle of

journey. God had been moving powerfully among the people and Joshua reminds the Israelites that God is not done yet. They are camped on the banks of the Jordan river, about to cross and continue to inherit their future. I can resonate with this text in so many ways and maybe you can too. When I was 43, I stood on the banks of the Jordan, well, sort of. I was about to head off to college and eventually seminary in preparation to follow this call. Let me tell you, my Jordan river seemed HUGE! No way I will get across this.

A few days after receiving this newsletter, I will begin as your full-time pastor. This is a big shift, a welcome one, but yet a big one. I will need to embrace new patterns and responsibilities and will say goodbye to 25 years building construction. Again, the Jordan seems huge. No way I will get across this. But the Israelite story was not held back by the Jordan and neither was mine. In the story, the priests carrying the ark of the covenant, the ark of promise came to the water's edge. Once their feet touched the waters of the Jordan the river

stopped and were pushed back. All of them were able to make it across on the dry riverbed. With God's promise in the lead so much is possible.

Once on the other side each tribe was commanded to bring a stone and place it by the edge of the river. The purpose of the stones was to serve as a reminder God's faithfulness. It was to give them hope as they faced new challenges and embraced new opportunities.

"so that all the peoples of the earth may know that the hand of the LORD is mighty" Joshua 4:24

I am writing this just after our first YES!

Gathering. I am not going to tip my hat too much because we want each of you to experience it fresh and new like the first group, but let me say this. At the end, one participant noted that he was not excited to come and that his wife "made him come."

This person indicated what a positive and hopeful experience it was, AND that they would be encouraging their friends to come the upcoming YES! Gatherings. These gatherings will collect some stones and might start to part the waters of Crosslake Lutheran's future. Better come and check it out!

I hope you have bee-, pet-, and people-friendly options for pest and weed control for your yard so that it is still safe to go outside. There are lots of on-line ideas as to how to repel what you hope is not in your yard. With the news about how

dangerous Roundup has been found to be, I am not sure how many of us grew up in chemically-safe environments (farm kids can tell pretty scary stories of pesticides and grain bins). Our bodies are amazing at being able to detox but there is always a point where it overwhelming to the immune system. There are wonderful options for chemical-free food as well—your local farmers markets

are a great source of food that is good for you and healthy, too.

The new date for the Final Gift has been set for August 15th from 11–4pm, thank you for your flexibility in the date change for the funeral. It will include all kinds of great information related to preparing a book for your family for end-of-life wishes. As we have talked about before, most of us think we have a lot of time to get "our affairs in order" but as we really know, that may or may not be true. Please make sure that your provider has a copy of any update Advanced Directives — a recent one that was reviewed listed someone's long deceased husband as Health Care agent which certainly does not work. It is a good thing to review any documents yearly for any changes that may be

needed especially in terms of finances or changes in your wishes.

Thanks to all who had a part in the music and art exhibit for **My Fathers World**. It is well documented that creating something helps to keep areas of the brain working as we age. There are a lot of options in terms of what to create as the exhibit so nicely portrayed. Be sure to visit the

Rug Hooking School that will happen mid-July in the Fellowship Hall to see another form of creating. Watch for the dates in the church calendar and be sure to come and vote for your favorite.

Flying Solo will also happen in July — this three-hour class on July 23rd is geared towards anyone who is beginning the next chapter of their life after

safest for hydration—it keeps organs working well, replenishes loss, keeps the fluid balance in circulation and around here does not contain chemicals and additives that can be harmful. Try to stay away from plastic single use bottles in order to be more caring to the environment—there are plenty of safe options for containers to hold water. Make it a goal to drink at least 5 glasses of water per day (unless you are advised by your provider to restrict fluids) if you start the day with a cold pitcher of lemon water, it is easier to keep track as to how you are doing.

I hope that you will enjoy a safe 4th that is free from fireworks accidents, sunburn, insect bites and water issues—be sure that someone is always the lifeguard (using a wrist band or baton helps to know who is in charge). Summer is a time to make wonderful memories and not spend time in your local ER.

In defining stewardship, W. H. Greever wrote, "Christian stewardship is the practice of the Christian religion. It is neither a department of life nor a sphere of activity. It is the Christian

conception of life as a whole, manifested in attitudes and actions."

Our faithful stewardship, as it reflects God's love, becomes our approach to life. It is more being than doing. Our deeds of stewardship such as using time wisely or helping the needy arise out of being stewards. Stewards are who we are. Stewardship is a whole life response to

God out of gratitude and thanksgiving for all of his love, goodness, and mercy. T. A. Kantonen wrote, "The life of stewardship is nothing less than 'total devotion' to the Christ who is known as a real, living personal presence in the hearts of believers, a genuine loyalty that is expressed not in mere opinion or sentiment but in character and conduct."



It does not take talented people to be faithful stewards, but it takes all there is of us. It takes our total commitment. Stewardship is our response to God's abundant grace in all aspects of life. This faithful stewardship is only possible when we acknowledge our sinfulness and our forgiveness through faith in Christ. God gives us faith so he can use us to carry out his plan, which is to save all people. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, we acknowledge God in all

things and in all places. As faithful stewards, we know that all we have belongs to him so we can give generously of our time, talents, and money.


