Pastor's Page



As I sit down to write this, I look outside to see a beautiful day unfolding. The weather is nice and one of the last few summer weekends is approaching. It makes my heart full and moves me to say a prayer of thanksgiving. It seems like one of those days when God does a fist pump and says,

"Yes!! Look at that!" "AND... Look at this..." Heeding the Spirit's call to look at what God is pointing me to, I turn to look at our church. We have a fantastic staff, an active and discerning council, a whole lot of groups doing all kinds of ministry, and you, the reader, the gathered people of God, the Church. You are active and courageous, willing to probe and explore, willing to experiment and test, willing to give and participate. In so many ways God has been active **through you** as God cultivates faith experiences for **all of us**. **Thank GOD!**

In a culture littered with fear and scarcity, with even many churches succumbing to fear and scarcity, we are an anomaly in this world with our distinctive and successful, Crosslake Lutheran style of proclaiming life, healing, and wholeness in the name of Christ. It is a beacon of hope in a tough world. Why are we flourishing? It seems this church has a gift for wondering what we need to "pick up" for ministering in this age, and, what we need to "let go" to minister in this age. This is a healthy behavior that makes us **nimble and responsive** in the massive cultural shifts we are experiencing. For example, a few years ago, this church noticed that families were so saturated with cultural pressures on the weekend that they struggled to participate in traditional ways of faith. So, this church said, YES...AND, to providing a worship experience and a meal on Wednesday. Wednesdays are now alive, providing faith experiences in so many ways. Our faith opportunities just keep expanding. Thank GOD!

Many good things do have a flipside to them. Take Sunday School for instance. Because of continued weekend pressures from sports, family life, and work, our Sunday attendance by parents with children has made big shifts to Wednesday. It is challenging to provide a meaningful faith experiences using traditional models. In order to make faithful use of our resources, the children's ministry folks suggested "letting go" and "picking up." On Sundays, we would "let go" of a classroom faith experience called "Sunday School" and "pick up" opportunities to provide faith experiences via "Worship Boxes." These boxes would change weekly to provide activities themed to the readings, songs, decorations, etc. Housed on shelves in the narthex they would replace the "busy bags" that currently hang on the tree. We will not be just keeping children busy as they open the lid, but rather moving them to discover all the ways God is active in the worship service. They will also include resources for faith activities during the week. The staff, executive council, and council have given their nod of support to this newest version of Crosslake **Lutheran saying YES...AND.** Look for the rollout of the Worship Boxes in the weeks to come. Thank GOD!

Now as I edit this, the weather has turned a bit. It is cloudy and windy. My thanksgivings for the weather might have waned a bit. My thanks though for what GOD is doing in this faith community has no end.

YES! Sermon Series

Thanks to all of you who participated in the YES! Gatherings this summer! We had wonderful conversations and Spirit-filled discernment about future ministry for our church. We discussed that we're now in an era that theologian Phyllis Tickle terms the "500 year great rummage sale" when every 500 years or so, the church "cleans house" deciding what to dispose and what to keep, making room for new things. As

we discussed we have already been doing this in many ways, to help make our church more of a place people can say "yes" to when our culture is one that Tickle says "people now cross denominational boundaries, seek common ground, engage diverse cultures, embrace social causes as ways to live out Christ's call to serve others, and ministry takes place largely outside of church buildings." How can Crosslake Lutheran continue to have more and more ministries that address these changes for how to be church? We started some great discussions about this with the gatherings, and at our October council retreat we will pick a few of these recurring ideas to work on in the coming year. But, in the meantime we are going to have a three part sermon series that also helps us think about what it means to be a YES! church in this time of change.

On Sundays Sept. 15, 29, and Oct. 6, we will take the three letters of Y-E-S, to help us continue to think and discern about God's call to us to be a YES! church in a new era of Christianity. Join us!

Elementary School Parent Meeting Wednesday, September 11th, 5:45 PM

During our Parking Lot Party on September 11, parents of elementary school students will take a few minutes to hear updates on programming for the year and have an opportunity to see how they can help make the year a great year for our children.

GROWing Kids will be resuming on Wednesday, September 18. Children will begin in worship with their parents and after the children's message, leave worship for a 30 minute class. For more information about the year and to volunteer to help with teaching, come to our information meeting on September 11 at 5:45 pm.

Sundays are going to have a different look this year and we are excited for the changes. There will not be Sunday School. Children will be able to stay in worship with their families. We are creating Worship Boxes that they can take into worship with them. In the boxes will be a variety of tools that will help them be more fully involved in worship. We also will be providing weekly devotions for families using the Faith5 model that we have been using in our education classes. Faith5 is a simple system where children and parents can

- 1) share their highs and lows
- 2) Read a Bible verse or Bible story
- 3) Talk about the Bible reading
- 4) Pray for each other's highs and lows
- 5) Bless each other

For many of us who grew up with Sunday School as the standard educational opportunity to learn the Bible stories and hear the words of God, this might be hard to understand. But study after study shows that children look to their parents to lead them in their faith journey and children benefit when they worship regularly. We will continue to offer educational opportunities for our children on Wednesdays and on Sundays we will be sure to develop worship that is welcoming to people of all ages.

Revelation and the Apocalypse

What image do you have of the word Apocalypse? Is it like the "end of days" captured in this artistic

rendering? "The Apocalypse or book of Revelation is one of the most engaging and disputed books in the Bible." This is Dr. Koester's opening line. Does it pique your curiosity? Have you always wanted to explore Revelation but have gotten lost in the imagery of beasts, horsemen, and dragons? Have you wondered how God could be working in this text with our cultural assumptions of the word Apocalypse? Are we supposed to read Revelation as a coded message to be unraveled? If it is a message to seven communities in Asia Minor two thousand years ago, then what do we do with it today?

Revelation has birthed beautiful music like "Holy, Holy, Holy" proclaiming God as sovereign of all. It also produced texts like "The Left Behind series" that leave you wondering whether God is good and loving. We will touch on many of these areas in our 6-week study of Revelation. We will look at the background of the apocalypse, look into the book itself and what it says, and conclude with exploring what people have done with this text. Here is roughly what you can expect. Bring your curiosity and join us on Wednesdays from 10:00-11:30.

September 18th Origins of the Book of Revelation & Issues facing its first readers or hearers

October 16th Revelation and music & Interpretations over the years

The Men's Workgroup will meet for the final time of the season on 9/13/2019. Join us at 8:30 am for breakfast and a fun time of fellowship, oh and a few hours of work.

Happy Fall, my personal favorite- time for school, getting the house ready for winter, etc. I pray that your summer was restful although from the sounds of it, unlikely that many of you just sat and looked at the water. It is wonderful to see how many of our congregation are involved in the many ways that volunteers support the organizations and groups around Crosslake. Research shows that folks that involved in volunteer work are happier, tend to enjoy better emotional health and have more social relationships. There are certainly many ways to volunteer within our faith family as well.

Thank you to the many folks that participate in Health Ministry programs. A great example is the wonderful group of women who gathered to make Angel food this past month- Mary Knight, Bert Flohr, Dorothy Gerdes, Virgene Johnson and Becky Kalton joined me in creating some wonderful home cooked meals that are part of the Angel food program. It not only produced great food but a good time was had by all! See me if you have questions about the food delivery

program or need food for short-term needs. Part of my role as a parish nurse is to assist folks finding resources for staying safely in their own home or finding an appropriate facility if staying home is no longer an option. One option to consider for staying home safely is to install a home monitoring system that can visually monitor your home interior. Your family is then able to access the camera to be sure that you are still upright and doing well. Many systems include a way to also talk to someone in the home as well as temp monitoring of the home. Technology has really improved over the past 5 years to assist in monitoring for unsafe situations. See me if you have questions about how the systems work. If you need a "Lifeline", now is the time to get that set up before everyone in your neighborhood leaves for the winter. If you already have a Lifeline, make sure that your contacts to call are updated to include your "winter" folks. Again, there are many options for call systems and many price points and features including GPS locating service (cannot be used if you have a pacemaker).

Another part of my role is to update all emergency action plans for our church. The Usher group is key to an emergency response and I will do a training session for them in September that will include the AED, what to do if someone collapses, etc. I also check all emergency equipment on a regular basis so that it is ready for use. If you see a situation that is unsafe, please see me or another staff person since prevention of injury is the best strategy. Unlit hallways that are used creates a risk for falls especially in folks that have vision issues. So if you see me turn lights on, I am trying to keep folks safe in the building.

At this time of year, please inspect your homes for wasp nests since this is the time they gather and also are more aggressive. If you are sensitive to bee stings, please make sure that your EPI pen is updated (prices have come down) and that once you use your pen you are to go the clinic or ED for further evaluation. Even if you have had a mild reaction in the past, it could be much worse

with each exposure and could be life threatening (airway closure and loss of BP). See your medical provider if you have questions about what to do.



Heart and Soul- September 17th doors open at 6pm. Dr. Fenstad will present "Women are from Venus, advances in diagnosis and treatment of heart disease in women. I will present the second half of the evening that will talk about memorywhat it is, how memories are formed and barriers to that process including dementias.

Powerful Tools for Caregivers- Lutheran Social Services will be conducting a 6-week class on supporting caregivers. Topics include stress reduction, communication, balance and finding resources. Sheet posted with info on how to sign up.

Matter of Balance classes- also will start after labor day on Tuesdays from 1-3pm for 8 weeks. This class includes ways to prevent falls and ways to improve balance and flexibility. Offered through Crow Wing Energized. Sheet posted with info on how to sign up. (continued on next page)

Befriender course- September 11 and 12th, this 1.5 day course looks at how to communicate through active listening and how the Befriender program works at Crosslake Lutheran. You can attend the class and not be a part of the team if you chose- it includes great tools for communication. See me if you need more information

Sharing God's Bounty

Sharing God's Love

As God's people, we are empowered by the Holy Spirit to follow Jesus' command to "Love [our] neighbor as ourselves]" (Matthew 22:39). We can share God's love because he has first loved us (1 John 4:19). God is the source of love that we give to others. When we love others, God's love is made complete (1 John 4:17). Love is the distinguishing mark of God's

It is both a privilege and a responsibility to share the love that God has given to us with others. In Romans 12:13 Paul wrote, "Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality." To the Galatians Paul wrote, "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers" (Galatians 6:10).

The following two contrasting stories in Scripture help us see how love can make such a huge difference in our relationship with and our attitude toward people:

In the story of Cain and Abel, we see Cain's total disregard for his brother Abel. After Cain had killed Abel, the Lord said to Cain, "Where is your brother Abel?" Cain said, "Am I my brother's keeper" Genesis 4:9). Cain was a man without faith and love. God's love did not dwell in Cain, and it showed in his actions. Cain also showed his lack of love for God by giving an inferior gift.

In the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37), God's Word gives us an example of how we are to share our love with others. Traveling on the road to Jericho, the Good Samaritan found a man who had been beaten and robbed. The Good Samaritan stopped and attended to the injured person. After he had bandaged his wounds, he took him to an inn where he paid for his

room and care. The Samaritan sacrificed money, time, and possessions and risked his own health and safety for this wounded stranger. By putting no limits on how far he was willing to go to help this man, the Samari tan demonstrated the love we should have for others. As God's

people filled with his love, we will be compelled to do acts of love for others.

"For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again" (2 Corinthians 5:14-15). Motivated by Christ's love and empowered by his Spirit, we will be eager to share God's love with others as we perform acts of service.

God has given us many gifts and calls us to use those gifts to build up his kingdom. Our faith identifies us as stewards and gives us a relationship with God. Many of these gifts are given for our needs; others are given for the needs of oth-ers. Stewardship is a ministry by which we nurture and share our gifts.
